

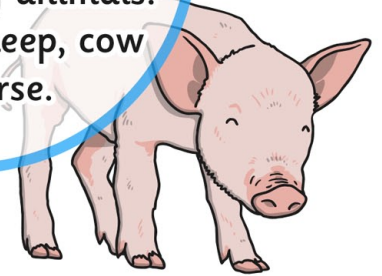
Spring Home Learning Challenge



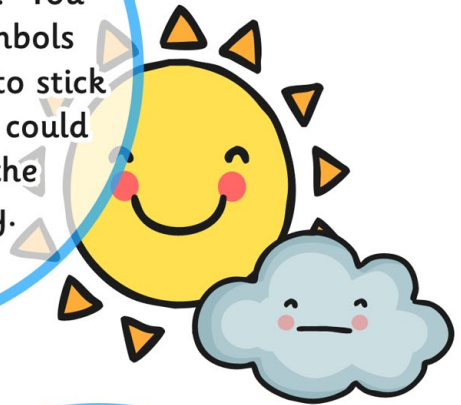
Go for a walk with a grown-up and look out for any signs of spring. You could draw a picture to show everyone what you saw.



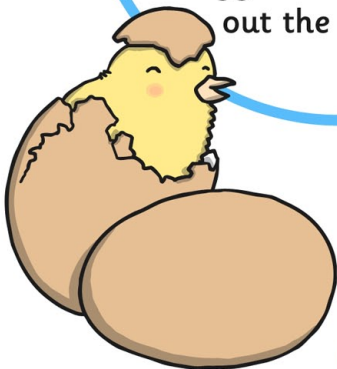
During spring, lots of animals have their babies. Find out the names of these baby animals: duck, pig, sheep, cow and horse.



Make a weather chart to show what the spring weather is like. You could cut out the symbols from the second sheet to stick on your chart, or you could draw a picture of the weather each day.



Hetty the Hen had 10 eggs. On Monday 4 eggs hatched into chicks. How many eggs were left in Hetty's nest? You could draw a picture of the eggs to help you work out the answer.



Draw a picture of a flower. Remember to draw some petals, a stem and some leaves on your flower.



During spring, seeds begin to grow. In the story of Jack and the Beanstalk, Jack's beans grow into a magic beanstalk. Tell the story of Jack and the beanstalk with a grown-up at home. You could even act the story out together!



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
