Lateness to School

Just a reminder to parents that the gates and registration are open between **8.50** – **9.00am**



each day. If your child is late after this time it could result in an unauthorised absence for that session. Ofsted view 6 or more missed sessions (equivalent to 3 days) per half term as putting a child at risk of being a persistent absentee. If such a pattern of absence continued over several half terms, it could result in the Education Welfare Officer (EWO) becoming involved.

A child coming late into school impacts on their time settling into class and therefore their learning. Being in school on time really makes a positive difference.

If your child is unwell, going to a medical appointment or unable to attend school for any other reason please call the school office by 9:30am on the first day of absence to let us know. This message will be passed on to the class teacher and entered onto the register.

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Share My Work

We are acutely aware that we have been unable to welcome parents into school in the way we would like over the last couple of years. Although we are still



going to run online parents' evening for this term, we would like to invite parents in to see your child's books and to have time to talk to your child about the learning they have been doing. Gamelan gong kebyar is a style or genre of Balinese gamelan music of Indonesia. *Kebyar* means "to flare up or burst open", and refers to the explosive changes in tempo and dynamics characteristic of the style. It is the most popular form of gamelan in Bali, and its best known musical export.

Gong kebyar music is based on a five-tone scale called *pelog selisir* (tones 1, 2, 3, 5, and 6 of the 7-tone pelog scale), and is characterized by brilliant sounds, syncopations, sudden and gradual changes in sound colour, dynamics, tempo and articulation, and complex, complementary interlocking melodic and rhythmic patterns called kotekan.

Gamelan is a genre of music and the name of the ensemble itself. It generally refers to a percussion orchestra made up predominantly of tuned gongs of various kinds and various types of metal-keyed instruments.

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Weekly Art



Pumpkin (2018) by Yayoi Kusama (b.1929)

Japanese artist Yayoi Kusama confesses to having an obsession with pumpkins that began in early childhood. She is drawn to their form (shape), colour and feel. She has abstracted (simplified) the basic elements of the pumpkin in this work to give it a rather humorous quality. But does she still manage to represent the pumpkin-ness of a pumpkin?

Growing up, the artist was surrounded by pumpkins on her family's seed farm, and she recalls dreamlike visions of them covered in dots. Kusama has spoken openly about her mental health and there is a strong association between her repetitive use of dots as a form of art therapy. She has covered pumpkins, rooms and even buildings in polka dots. The dot motif characterises her work and the idea of repetition feeds into the concept of mindfulness which is increasingly valued for improved wellbeing. The endless repetition of dots is said to relate to big ideas about infinity and the cosmos. In this sense, her humble pumpkin could be understood in both micro terms - insofar as it relates to aspects of her personal life - and macro terms, insofar as it relates to some of the biggest ideas human beings ponder.

Questions to support discussion:

- Does the pumpkin look realistic? Why or why not?
- If the banana-ness of a banana was that it was long and curved and yellow, what would the pumpkin-ness of a pumpkin be?
- What do the patterns remind you of?
- Why are the dots different sizes across the pumpkin?
